

GHR 800N - A Unique Occasion

The Morris Minor built in Swindon - GHR 800N - has been owned by just two families in its 50-year life, and it was a great pleasure to welcome both of them to our AGM. It was also a pleasure to witness the warmth of feeling between them - having only met each other for the first time just a few weeks before!

Rod Law, who ordered the car to be built in Swindon for his father in 1974, and his daughter Denise, came down from Northamptonshire. Andy Smith and his daughter Sophie, in whose family the car has been since 1992, came down from Derbyshire. We were privileged to have their company and to hear their stories.

We were also joined by Robert Harrin, nephew of Patrick Harrin who built the car at Dutton Forshaw's Victoria Garage in Swindon; and by Pete Cosslett, who took part in the Charity Car Pull for Cancer Research in 1982.

We heard that Rod's father Edwin, who had learnt to drive on a Bullnose Morris, only ever owned Minor saloons - nine of them before this one - between 1954 and 1974. His wife Gwendoline wrote to British Leyland's Austin Morris Group in April 1973 to order another one and received the following reply: ... "this model was discontinued some three years ago now

and there are no new Minors remaining unsold anywhere in the country. I am sorry to have to disappoint you..."

Rod however took this as a challenge. He went to see Percy Gerrish at Victoria Garage and persuaded him to task his new storeman with listing all the parts required to build a Minor saloon from scratch - about 1800 of them. This list was then sent to Unipart in Cowley, who confirmed that they could all be sourced. Rod told us, "Percy fell off his chair when I said, *Right, get on and build it!*"

Body, trim and paint work were done by Bampton Brothers Coachbuilders in Swindon. The mechanical work was entrusted to Patrick Harrin and carried out in the showroom on Victoria Hill, where passers-by could watch. The build was used by Dutton Forshaw and Leyland for publicity purposes and thanks to Rod and Denise we were able to see some photographs that we had not seen before. One of them shows Patrick and Rod surrounded by a mass of parts. The one part they couldn't source was the turnbolt on the passenger door lock, but an appeal in the media resulted in a deluge of them!

Regarding the colour, Rover Bronze Green, Rod told us that he took current Leyland colour samples up to his father and that was the one he chose. In one or two places a white patch is visible because the shell was delivered as "body in white", with Bampton's doing the spray job.

Robert Harrin told us his uncle was a conscientious and reserved man who never swore, but one of the few occasions when he used bad language was

when the photographer moved parts around which he had carefully placed where he needed them!

Edwin did see the car completed but sadly died before he could drive it. GHR then lived in Halifax with his widow Gwendoline, who learnt to drive on it. One of the mysteries of the car was explained - the dip switch was moved from the floor to below the dashboard at Gwendoline's request.

In 1982 Rod, who was then Chair of North Wiltshire Branch of the MMOC, had another ambitious idea. This was to use the car to raise money for Cancer Research by pulling it, on foot, from Swindon to Cowley. The car was driven down from Halifax for the purpose and members of Leeds Branch helped. It was pulled in teams, with ropes also attached at the rear to retain it on the downhill stretches - "If we had used the brakes it wouldn't have been a true car pull," said Rod. The report at the time records only a lunch stop at the Lamb and Flag in Longworth, but Rod said, "We stopped at every pub!"

Eventually, in 1991, Rod's family decided to sell the car and took it to Hampson's, a specialist auctioneer. It remained there for a year, registered under another name. Rod thinks it may have been used as collateral in the auctioneer's business. At any event it then came under the hammer in 1992, when it was bought by Andy Smith's father-in-law Eric, a keen car enthusiast and rally driver. Andy said, "I was with him at the auction, we both said, this is so unique, it was just perfect. Luckily won it, and he drove it home."

So it was driven to auction by Rod and driven away by Eric, an almost tangible contact between the two families which Rod has reinforced by giving Andy one of his father's club ties which he wore when driving!

Since Eric's death the car has been in storage in Andy's garage. It still has all its original components. It has appeared at a number of big shows and Andy brought it back to the Swindon area for our North Wilts Branch Rally at Lyneham in September 2022.

Until mid-2025 we did not know Rod's whereabouts and Rod did not know that the car was still in existence. Denise, who was born in Swindon, was scrolling through some local social media sites and came across the story of the build of the car in "Strolling in Swindon". Curious to find out if the car still existed, she found its DVLA listing online and then contacted the MMOC, who put her on to Andy. The upshot was a visit in October 2025 by Rod and Denise to see Andy and the car - the first time Rod had seen it since he drove it to auction in 1991.

Our sincere thanks to Rod and Denise and to Andy and Sophie for so generously travelling down to share their stories and answer our questions. It was a unique occasion indeed.
